16 'Rejoice always, 17 pray without ceasing, 18 give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.' 1 Thessalonians 5 v 16-18 NIV

In July 17, 1887 Augustus Strong and John D. Rockefeller visited Charles Spurgeon at his home in London.

After two hours, the leading Baptist theologian and the wealthy U.S. tycoon uncovered the secret of Spurgeon's ministry: "He seemed to be a man of prayer" (Crerar Douglas, Autobiography of Augustus Hopkins Strong, 300). Spurgeon once said, "Prayer has become as essential to me as the heaving of my lungs, and the beating of my pulse." Here are 2 ways how Charles Spurgeon prays.

1. Ask boldly! You are beloved!

"Our God not only hears prayer but also loves to hear it"
"Do not let us go to God as though we were strangers, or as though he were unwilling to give—we are greatly beloved"
"It would be of no use to knock at a wall, but you may wisely knock at a door, for it is arranged for opening"
"God keeps a file for our prayers—they are not blown away by the wind, they are treasured in the King's archives"

2. Hold God to His promises

"He can reverse nature, but he cannot reverse his own nature, and he must do this before he forebear to hear and answer prayer"

"The Spirit of God leads us to desire exactly what God has decreed"

"The best praying man is the man most believingly familiar with the promises of God. After all, prayer which is not based on a promise has no true foundation"

Thank GOD For The NHS

'The NHS will last as long as there are folk left with the faith to fight for it.' – Aneurin Bevan

There aren't many British institutions that evoke a sense of wellbeing, even love. The BBC is sometimes known as 'Aunty' but how should we refer to the National Health Service (NHS)? Mum, dad, grandma? For many people reading this article, the NHS was present at our birth, cares for us throughout our lives and will witness our death in some way or another. Nigel Lawson, a former Conservative Chancellor of the Exchequer once famously remarked that the NHS is 'the closest thing the English have to a religion'. And this year the NHS is 70 years old. A stately age, commanding respect and even love. Earlier in the summer, a special service of thanksgiving was held at Westminster Abbey to celebrate the NHS. Religion was indeed lauding this venerable institution.

The Chief Executive of NHS England, Simon Stevens, quoted from the Archbishop of Canterbury's book Reimagining Britain: Foundations for hope where he says that the NHS was 'the most powerful and visible expression of our Christian heritage' because it 'sprang out of a concern that the poor should be able to be treated as well as the rich'.

A recent healthcare initiative in the UK, sees churches reaching into their communities through so-called 'parish nurses'. Parish Nursing Ministries UK (PNMUK)4 was set up by Dr Helen Wordsworth, a Baptist Minister. Inspired by the work of parish nurses in the USA, this organisation seeks to integrate basic nursing into a church's pastoral care. Through employing qualified nurses, an increasing number of churches are making contact with people who would otherwise not attend church but are happy to come to clinics and talk about their health and associated anxieties.

In this environment, prayer is offered and readily accepted. Follow up is referred back to the NHS system but the church as a therapeutic community of friends is making its mark. Health is an important issue in the Bible and the Church has a long tradition in medicine, nursing and seeking the common good of everyone, of all faiths and none. Thank God for the NHS.
